

STUDENTS' UNION REVIEW

Firstly, well done to everyone. This year was the first one after the ultimate decision made by the University to withdraw from the Cheshire campus. We could have given up, but instead, everyone has persisted. We've seen student commitment like never before, and it's been wonderful to see student cohorts from all backgrounds banding together to keep the unmatched campus family atmosphere going.

During the summer, The Union here at Cheshire worked closely with the University to carry on the work of my predecessor, aiding to shape a new provision for Cheshire. The result of this was the announcement of a project for the penultimate academic year at Crewe, titled Campus Plus. The scheme was introduced to enhance the student experience at the campus by providing activity and extra resources to make your university experience more gratifying and enhancing your academic skills. I'm sure a lot of you have made good use this year of the free parking, the free gym membership, changes to assessment regulations and will soon take advantage of your four free graduation tickets. Wednesdays were re-invented with Skills+, with the University offering skills workshops and wellbeing sessions, such as yoga, CV writing and the hugely successful Frontrunner programme, with 50 students attending the globally recognised programme.

The most used aspect of Campus Plus has to be Project Cheshire. Many of you have championed the bids, providing the campus with more events and activity than ever before. Project Cheshire was launched in the last term of the previous academic year, with bids for an end of year fun day. This year there were 16 successful bids, with events like Disco Dodgeball, 12 Hour Netball, MMUC's GotTalent, Man vs Food, Crewe Pauls Drag Race, Lip Sync and many other events taking place over the course of the year.

Our close-knit community has prevailed over any struggles we have faced. We fought for more academic provisions, which materialised in the form of changes to the assessment regulations for all students – an example being the Trail a Fail scheme, allowing students who may have just missed the benchmark for a pass on a unit to carry these credits over to next year and resit, whilst continuing their studies with their peers. This ensured all students would pass, progress and graduate together.



Welcome Back Week

We kicked off Welcome Back Week with a trip to Alton Towers! Freshers' Fair this year was replaced with taster sessions for our clubs and societies to recruit new members. We lacked the bright eyed and bushy tailed freshers, who would sign up for literally everything, so your job this year was much harder than any other. Although your numbers may not have grown like previous years, you have integrated yourselves and your members into every aspect of The Union and exceeded our expectations of support and inclusivity. Our clubs and societies also organised multiple events during the week to recruit new members. Giggle Dungeon ran their stand-up comedy night, a collaboration of societies saw the return of the Society Showcase, Basketball hosted Disco Dodgeball and Film Club had a cosy movie night.

We hosted a Welcome BBQ outside The Union, which saw over 500 staff and students attend and provided a fantastic platform for the Cheshire campus community to come together, and of course take full advantage of the microbrewery.



Union Campaigns & Change 2017-2018


Every year, your elected Student Officers campaign on issues that matter to you. This year our campaigns have been about informing our student body and making institutional change. Your Officers have worked hard in front and behind the scenes, leading on multiple campaigns and projects throughout the year.

Student safety was a concern in Cheshire, and as a result we lobbied Cheshire East Council during the first term to replace the broken fence and add lighting to the alley in an effort to improve safety around campus. Although this is not finished, we made a small step

























in the right direction. Around the Christmas period The Union worked with the University to recreate the Christmas Fair, and with support from Project Cheshire it was bigger and better than before.

Our Activities Officers worked together to launch the #TakeAStand campaign in January, encouraging our clubs to say no to antisocial behaviour and provide an inclusive space on and off the pitch.

We continued our NUS award-winning campaign, It's OK. The Officers looked at tackling the stigma around talking about mental health and the impact staying silent has on men and offered information on where to get help. In February we brought in The Comedy Trust to run workshops with our self-identifying male student population, to encourage people to speak up about their mental health and the struggles they face. February also saw your President Hussain deliver the Student Leadership Conference, where student leaders could listen to inspirational speakers, join workshops and upskill themselves. We also celebrated LGBT+ History Month.

In March we launched The Period Project, removing the tax from sanitary products in our shop and offering free products to help students with periods from low-income backgrounds. We also saw the return of our annual, much anticipated event, Old Boys. Your Education Officer Luca also drove a campaign that required all dissertations to be online submission only, with the exception of some creative courses.

In April The Union completed its one-to-ones with all of our sports clubs, teams and societies to ensure new committees are formed next year and their clubs continue to thrive, in whatever way possible.

So far May has been full of celebrating you and your achievements – from balls to awards nights like tonight. De-stress Week returned, aimed at tackling the increasing stress levels around exam season. I personally enjoyed the cuddly animals.

Lead Your Union elections

With the new academic year, The Union saw new leadership. I was honoured to be elected as your Vice President Cheshire, with Andy Young by my side as Activities Cheshire. Hussain El-Amin took on the role of President; Luca Raimo remained your Education Officer, Owen Jones as your Activities Manchester and Lily Smith as Community.

The officer roles have changed for next year, leaving one officer in Cheshire. The title of the role was debated, and it was concluded that the role would retain the Vice President title, so Cheshire had a deputy at the head of the ship, leading The Union at full steam. With the new title, came a new remit, and will see the Vice President Cheshire be 100% dedicated to the campus in its final year. This year's elections saw my team MMU4U elected as your officer team for the 2018/19 academic year. I'm sure you all know already, but I will be handing over my crown to Andy Young as the final ever Vice President Cheshire. I will be moving up to Manchester as your President, Lucy Follon is your new Education Officer, Andy Harmon your Wellbeing Officer, Anna Welsh is Societies and Development and Ross Sharman as Sport Officer.

As your elected Vice President, I could not be prouder to call this campus my home for four years – I will be visiting regularly to check in on everyone. I wish everyone the best, whether you're graduating or continuing with us for another year.

STUDENT OPPORTUNITIES REVIEW

This year community has been the driving force behind all societies and sports here at Cheshire. With the first ever collaborative sport and society events, inclusion has been a big theme for every club and society this year. This year you have completed 32 amazing student-led events.

Societies have been keeping themselves busy with many different events, performances and rehearsals throughout the year. It has been amazing for me personally to get a sense of how talented you all are. Being your Officer this year has shown me how hard and committed our societies are here and I have a new-found level of respect for every individual involved in one.

Sports teams as usual have been training hard all year readying themselves for their BUCS leagues or their competitions outside of BUCS – with no freshers this year, teams have had to rely on their second and third year students to represent their teams. The BUCS season commenced on the 11 October 2017. Overall, Manchester Met won 253, drew 28 and lost 231. This year was a mixed year for us here at Cheshire. With 24 wins, 1 draw and 66 losses the teams all fought hard for the campus throughout the year, and this can be seen in Cheshire's points difference. Cheshire scored 1,437 points and conceded 1,299 – when our teams won, they won big and when they lost, it was very close.

Here is a little bit about what all of our amazing clubs and societies have been up to this year.

Archery had a rocky start to this year and were initially not a club. With incredible dedication from the Chair and other members, the club then took off and have not looked back. As a club, they went from initially having two members to consistently having a full committee and a few other members training week in, week out. Cheshire Archery is now the first club with a cross-campus committee and they intend to move the club to Manchester even after the campus closure to ensure Archery continues at Manchester Met for many years to come.

The Badminton Club has struggled for numbers this year, but have competed hard in every game they have played. Both men's and women's have fought against all competition this year — sometimes the team only missed the win by only two sets. Despite the lack of numbers and struggles, the team have prided themselves on the fact they support each other on and off the court, and in true Cheshire fashion have become a family unit. The team has taken part and been strong supporters of other clubs and society-led events that have happened on campus this year.

Basiks have pushed themselves more than ever this year performing more varied routines. At the start of the year, they took part in the Society Showcase and hosted their dance evenings, where the whole campus had the chance to try out new styles of dance that they might not have tried before. They also performed and helped organise Genesis' 'Spookfest', which involved the society choreographing

their own piece to end the event on a high. They have been incredibly friendly and open to everyone that has attended. This year, the team was able to perform at the Elections Results night,

representing Cheshire at The Union in Manchester! As the society plans for next year, they hope to have another successful year like this one, as well as trying to re-organise the 'Dance-a-thon' event.

Men's Basketball at Cheshire have been a very visible club this year, both on and off the court. They hosted two charity fundraising events - both 'Waterpong' and Disco Dodgeball were fun and inclusive events for all to take part in. On the court, the team finished as the only Cheshire based team to win their BUCS league and be promoted, with a record of 9 wins and 1 loss including a 113-43 thrashing of UCLAN and being unbeaten at home in the league - the Cheshire Sports Hall is now a fortress to fear for any opposition travelling here. With an incredible cup run on top of this, they beat the opposition from a league above them and eventually bowed out at the quarter final stage in one of the closest, highest scoring games of the year. The team also hopes to have gone unbeaten this term to finish second in their MABL league and enter the playoffs. They hope to enter next year with a spring in their step after a very successful season and look to go from strength to strength.

The Boxing club this year has not had as many training sessions as last year due to students' workloads. However, when they have trained, the people who have turned up have put in the effort and desire required for such a physically demanding sport. All members have dug deep and shown that they want to improve. The Chair stated that he is 'truly grateful' and 'going forward I wish everyone at the club all the best and hope you achieve what you are capable of'.

Cheerleading as usual have been perfecting their routines throughout the year to ensure it was competition ready. With the team placing and scoring stronger in their second competition than their first, they showed they wanted to improve throughout the year, eventually winning their second competition. They have hosted three events: 'Tumble-a-thon', MMUC's GotTalent and the always-popular Lip Sync Battle. As well as this, they have hosted inclusive training sessions for all students to give cheerleading a go. Throughout the year, as their name would suggest, they have been fantastic cheerleaders for other clubs and societies that have needed support. Next year they hope to compete in national competitions again and potentially perform their routines at half time of sports games or as an open event for all to see.

Choral Society have taken part in four events this year, the first being Society Showcase at the very beginning of the year. They also ran their own performance in conjunction

with the Christian Union, performing at the Christmas Fair and then performing again in the evening in Axis. The society also won MMUC's GotTalent and performed at the interval of Lip Sync Battle. The society hope to host their own charity event next year alongside other societies, and they are keen to host a showcase in Manchester next year involving as many Manchester societies as they can. The group is also keen to host taster sessions to try to recruit new members to the society for the final year of Cheshire.

This year has been a very interesting year for the Christian Union. They started the year with around 20 members who remained from the previous year. They have also gained four new members, which helped to take their total to 24 the highest number the society has seen in several years. The society took part in many different activities throughout the year, such as the Christmas Carol Concert, Hangover pack handout at Old Boys, Worship night and Coffee and chat with a Christian, which enabled them to grow closer. The CU also ran connect groups where people from all different backgrounds came together to discuss life and faith, which was able to make the society become more welcoming and inclusive. Next year the Christian Union wish to carry on the amazing engagement they have had in the last two years and provide a safe haven for students on campus from all backgrounds.

Although there have been minimal numbers involved in Equestrian this year, the club have tried their utmost to make the club still accessible for those who wanted to take part. They also tried different aspects of equestrian this year, such as polo and horse ball lessons (if you do not know what horse ball is look it up on YouTube – it is amazing). The club hopes to have more members next year, and this is definitely looking possible with students showing an interest in the sport for next year.

Film Society unfortunately did not have enough members to continue for the whole year, but still managed to run an event in Welcome Back Week at the start of the year, which was a huge success! The society now have members that have become part of other societies on campus – this shows how students in Cheshire are all one big family.

Men's Football are one of two sports teams to have two teams in BUCS leagues this year. They have also decided that next year they will reduce to one team. Football had a mixed season this year with both teams struggling in BUCS. However, the club also entered the Cheshire Cup and had an amazing run getting to the semi-finals. The boys also had a few big wins in the league this year, with the best being a 4-0 win against Liverpool. The team have had some incredible standout players this year, with Ryan Cattermole representing MMU Cheshire in the England university football squad. Off the pitch, the boys hosted their annual Blind Date charity night, which as always was good fun to watch. The club as a whole have been to nearly every event run by another club or society and have always entered individuals or teams when needed. Next year the club hope to ensure that football at Cheshire ends in the best way possible and plan to win the BUCS league, ending the campus closure on a high.

Women's Football have done huge amounts of work to integrate themselves with other teams and societies on campus. The girls struggled for numbers this year in their BUCS league but amazingly still managed to field a side for every game except one. With 10 players all season, the girls battled against teams bringing 16 players and still managed to win two games, the most satisfying being a 2-1 victory against the University of Football Business. If the girls had the numbers, they would be one of the toughest teams to beat this year. The team also entered the Cheshire 5-a-side competition and ended up winning, as well as entering the People's FA cup and getting through to the final, which will be played at St. Georges Park, England's national football centre. Off the pitch, the girls have taken part in many different student-led events and have organised a charity bubble football 5-a-side competition with the Netball team. Next year, the team is grouping together and entering the BUCS 11-a-side league hoping for success in the last year of Cheshire.

Genesis as in previous years have been the largest society on campus. At the start of the year they held welcome back sessions and then organised and performed in the Society Showcase. With help from Basiks, Genesis produced their performance of 'Spookfest' which took groups of students, staff and family members on an spooky stroll around the Cheshire campus with many different stories all linking into one. The society have also done a bake sale this year and a pool tournament for different charities (Break and Mind). The annual trip to London went ahead as usual and was another success. Their end of year performance was 'The Servant of Two Masters', which was a superb way to end the year. Next year, the society hope to perform not only in Cheshire but also in Manchester, as well hoping that after the campus closure Genesis will continue as a successful society in Manchester.

Giggle Dungeon have hosted three shows this year starting in Welcome Back Week, where they worked with professional comedians to produce an amazing night of stand-up comedy. They also performed 'Christmas Come Early' and on 10 May 'Giggle's Greatest Hits' which were both rib ticklers for all that watched. As a society, they have been on tour to Amsterdam and taken part in the Comedy Trust event run by The Union to help men talk about mental health through comedy. The society believes they have reached their aims for this year, which was to ensure everyone felt comfortable and included in their sessions. Next year Giggle Dungeon will continue to make us laugh and provide support for all of us.

Hockey have been a joint team with Manchester for a few years now, and once again had a few members from Cheshire playing for the club in Manchester. The Club also hosted their annual Man vs Food event jointly with Netball.

MMUsical Theatre started the year as most societies did, performing in the Society Showcase with two group numbers. Throughout the year, they have taken part in a number of event and won Lip Sync Battle. They ran three events of their own as well: MMUsical Theatre Showcase, MMUC's Got Talent (jointly with Cheerleading) and a bake sale, which raised money for their chosen charities, Autism

Inclusive and Macmillan. After Christmas, the society began working on their production of the musical The Addams Family. With a whole script to learn on top of all of their studies, this was a lot of work but the society pulled through and both nights of the performance were amazing. The society had four members go on society tour and during the year they have had pamper nights to create a closer bond with everyone in the group. Next year they hope to perform in Manchester at some point and have as much fun as they have had this year.

Netball were one of two clubs in Cheshire that still had two teams competing in BUCS leagues. Both teams put 100% into every game they played, winning three games (including a home win against the Manchester campus team). They have decided that next year the two teams will merge into one, hoping for success in the league. They have regularly competed and put on charity events throughout the year, which has raised a total £1,365.88 for their charity CRY. These events have included the netball tournament, Man vs Food, 12-hour netball-a-thon, two bake sales and All Star Family Fortunes. These events have added huge vibrancy to the campus and the girls have done an amazing job organising them. We hope to see your off-field success match your on-field success next year in the final year of netball.

Open Mic originally started this year as just a group of students until they reaccredited themselves to become a society. They have been amazing, providing a platform for students to perform or just get away from the pressures of university work. They hosted nights in the Student Zone twice a month that were very successful. From the society, performers and groups have formed – Unscripted was one of these bands, which included four of the society's members. They represented the society at MMU's Got Talent and the campus in Manchester at Election Results night. The society have taken part in many events in Cheshire this year too. They end the year on a high note, with many people feeling more confident to perform and many friendships formed.

Plant Club are our newest society this year, taking over and renaming the Sustainability and Growth Society with a catchier and more upbeat name. The group have spent time preparing to fully launch in the new academic year; however, they have competed in a few student-led events, coming third in CrewePaul's Drag Race, and have supported other events that have gone on this year. Next year they have loads of plans from charity fundraising for environmental charities to trips to many different environmental locations, with the big goal being visiting the Eden Project.

Pole Fitness have had a consistent group of members attend their sessions all year. As a society, they have taken part in the majority of the charity events that have occurred on campus this year. The society took part in the Showcase and held taster sessions at the start of the year for people to try something brand new (trust me, it's harder than it looks). They are always one of the first to lend their support to others, again showing the Cheshire family spirit that we pride ourselves on so much here. After contacting the

Manchester society, the team hope to meet up with them and join them next year to host joint sessions and create a partnership between the two societies for more inclusive and open training sessions.

The Rugby team have not played in BUCS this year and so decided to become more of a social club. As a result, they have attracted more members, making the club more inclusive than previous years. Rugby have been the most active club concerning off campus fundraising and volunteering this year. They took part in a Remembrance Day March where they laid a wreath on behalf of the University and another on behalf of The Union at Crewe cenotaph. They took part in a collection for Macmillan at a super league rugby club raising around £500 to support cancer patients. They have run their own socials this year themed around Harry Potter and included many other societies and individuals in these, providing an opportunity for the lads left to still come together and have fun.

Swimming and Water Polo started the year as a Cheshire team, but struggled with numbers. They took the decision to merge the club with Manchester, so the girls could still play competitively. The merge seemed to work well, with the Cheshire students all playing a vital part in the team's unbeaten season with huge wins, including a 22-8 victory in the cup final over the University of Sheffield. The club have participated in as many student-led events as possible, and were one of only two Cheshire teams that went on the sports tour this year. Next year they hope to set up good relationships with the Crewe flyers swimming club and Stafford Water Polo team to ensure that students can swim and play Water Polo next year.

Volleyball came out of their shell this year. They have hosted regular training sessions with an increased number of people turning up to these compared to last year, leading to the club doubling in size. Both the men's and women's teams have competed in BUCS leagues and the Merseyside league throughout the year, with the men's team winning seven games and the women's team winning three. Many of the team also represented Manchester Met at Varsity this year against Leeds Beckett University. This was possible due to the close relationship the team have made with the volleyball teams in Manchester, leading to the teams spending most of their time together on sports tour. Next year the club hope to still have male and female representation for volleyball on the Cheshire campus, and carry on the positive vibe they have had as a club this year!

Cheshire, you have done so much this year and I feel so proud of all of you. Without our sports clubs and societies, our campus would never have been as vibrant as it has been this year. Every time I have seen you, you have had a smile on your face and a tale to tell. Trust me, this is not the easiest job in the world, but working with you lot has made it the most enjoyable. Honestly, I feel honoured and humble to have represented you this year, and cannot wait to represent you again next year. I will finish as I always have done.


