3. My Priorities and What I Will Do

A. Improve Digital Tools (MMU App & Moodle)

Digital systems should support your learning, not block it. I will:

- Push for clear, student-friendly guides and induction sessions on key platforms.
- Work with staff so lecture slides, readings, and recordings are uploaded on time and clearly labelled.
- Champion regular checks and quick fixes for broken links and missing materials.
- Advocate for more consistent Moodle layouts across modules.

When students know exactly where to find what they need, they can focus on learning.

B. High-Quality Teaching and Learning

Every student deserves teaching that is engaging and relevant. I will:

- Partner with course reps and programme teams to escalate and resolve teaching issues.
- Push for clear learning outcomes and updated content that reflects current developments.
- Encourage more inclusive teaching methods that support different learning styles.
- Ensure student feedback is not just collected but acted on, with clear updates on what has changed.

C. Fair Assessment and Feedback

Assessment should be fair and predictable. I will:

- Push for clear marking criteria to be shared at the start of every unit.
- Advocate for timely, constructive feedback that helps students improve.
- Work to prevent clusters of deadlines that harm wellbeing.
- Support more dialogue around assessment design so students have a voice in what "fair" looks like.

D. Support for International and Postgraduate Students

As an international postgraduate, I understand the unique pressures you face. I will:

- Highlight issues around visas, placements, and transitions that are often under-prioritised.
- Push for tailored academic and wellbeing support during key transition points.

- Advocate for clearer communication on key processes so no one is disadvantaged by lack of information.
- Work with liberation groups and societies to ensure international students feel part of the wider community.

E. Strengthening the Student Voice

Real change needs a strong student voice. I will:

- Support course reps with better training, visibility, and recognition.
- Make sure reps have regular opportunities to influence decisions at School and Faculty level.
- Champion inclusive campaigns that amplify voices often overlooked, including international, disabled, working, and commuter students.
- Keep communication open through drop-ins, online Q&As, and regular updates on progress.

4. How I Will Work if Elected

If elected, I will be:

- Visible and approachable: running regular drop-ins on campus and online, responding quickly to concerns.
- Collaborative: working closely with course reps, societies, networks, and Union staff.
- Transparent and accountable: setting clear goals and providing termly updates on what has been achieved and what is in progress.
- Strategic: as a Student's Union Trustee, helping to protect the long-term quality of education at MMU.
